Tamara Burlando is a multidisciplinary visual artist. Her work embraces multicultural integration, creating nets and relationships that support coexistence, mutual learning, and respectful exchanges.

Her works oscillate from photographs printed in delicate tea bag patchworks, wool installations within the trees' branches, and multiple-coloured stitched soft sculptures to create a conversation between 2 cultures, collaborations with other women artists, and the performance of her intuitive ceremonies of identity and belonging.

Tamara explores art as a tool of discovery and healing, a path to reconnect with the land and remember untold stories. Also as a quest for ancient knowledge.

Tamara was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, from a mix-heritage (Uruguayan, Huarpe, European). She holds BFA, with Majors in Sculpture & Photography, and she is currently undertaking a Post-grad Certificate in Creative Therapies with Indigenous perspectives, at Darwin University, Australia.
